The current US healthcare environment is short on quality and long on costs. The concept of value-based purchasing seeks to address this problem by asserting that buyers should hold providers of health care accountable for both cost and quality of care. Pay-for-performance (P4P), a type of value-based purchasing, provides an incentive-based reimbursement system that rewards top performers. P4P is already in use in managed care and in some hospitals. This presentation will explore the basic premise of P4P, review current P4P models and discuss how pharmacists can best prepare for and participate in this new model.

In addition, we will discuss the limitations of the various creatinine clearance formulas.

To address this problem and to help educate the community, the Greater Spokane Substance Abuse Council (GSSAC) along with Northwest HIDTA have developed a companion program to the Meth Watch Community Presentation called **Washington State Rx Watch**. This newly designed prescription drug awareness program was modeled after Meth Watch and is a much needed entity throughout the community. **WA Rx Watch** is a community presentation that is targeted to and pertains to Washington State. It covers a wealth of information covering most commonly abused prescription drugs, prenatal drug use, internet pharmacies, doctor shopping, etc. Since the implementation of the **Washington State Rx Watch program**, we have trained over 125 people on how to conduct these presentations on their own. GSSAC's goal is to conduct the **Washington State Rx Watch Community Presentation & Train the Trainer** courses throughout Washington State to build a network of presenters through coalitions/organizations for this environmental strategy.
